I Have Called You by Name

The international conference on the theme "I Have Called You by Your Name" took place from the $14-16^{th}$ November in Lourdes. The keynote speakers, the Larondina dancers and the seminar facilitators inspired all present and enlightened our vision and understanding of disability in the mission of the Church.

The crisp Autumnal weather, clear blue skies, good food and great company enhanced what can only be described as a thought provoking, refreshing and uplifting weekend.

The enthusiasm and energy of each speaker was brought alive as they shared their own experiences with us, as well as some anecdotes.

For me, the most poignant message from the conference was the importance of slowing down. Jean Vanier in his heartrending story of Eric portrayed the importance of slowing down and being at peace with ourselves. Society and the demands of everyday life propel us to move too fast and we miss the real meaning of life. We may fail to realise and address the fragility of being human and the hidden disabilities that lie within all of us. In the words of Jean Vanier "we all have these hidden disabilities, which is a difficulty to relate, a difficulty to forgive, not to be controlled by fear, by prejudice, to think we are part of an elite or whatever it is. No. We're all people who are disabled. With some, it's more visible, it's obvious. Eric is very visible."

Sometimes our busy lifestyles mean we don't take time to talk to others and take notice. The conference provided the opportunity to talk to strangers, an element of pilgrimage as alluded to by Fr. Michael Drumm, another key note speaker. Upon return from pilgrimage, we should draw upon our experience there to enhance our relationships at "home".

Each evening culminated with performances from the Larondina dancers. The ethos and spirituality of this conference for me was depicted through their gentle, graceful and elegant movement which touched all present.

St. Bernadette



During the Jubilee Year of 2008 in Lourdes we celebrated the 150th anniversary of the apparitions. We were invited to walk the jubilee way: visiting the Parish Church where Bernadette was baptised, the Hospital chapel where she received her First Holy Communion, the Cachot where she lived and finally the grotto where Mary greeted Bernadette. During this year the Lourdes authorities have invited all pilgrims to follow the Way of Bernadette. It is not so much to follow the life story of Bernadette but rather to explore four components of her Christian life and nourish our own life with God through her experience. So again this year we will walk the 'jubilee way' and be invited to deepen our love of Jesus and his Mother through the story of Bernadette.



Bernadette was born on January 7th 1844 and lived her life in Lourdes and Never. Daughter of François Soubirous (1807–1871), and his wife Louise (née Castérot) (1825–1866), Bernadette was the eldest of five children who survived infancy. Bernadette was baptized at the local parish church, St. Pierre's, on January 9, which was her parents' wedding

anniversary. Bernadette's godmother was Bernarde Casterot, her mother's sister. Hard times had fallen on France and the family lived in extreme poverty.




On February 11, 1858, Bernadette, then aged 14, was out gathering firewood with her sister and a friend at the grotto of Massabielle. On this day Bernadette had the first of 18 visions. In this vision, Bernadette observed "a small young lady" (uo petito damizelo) standing in a niche in the rock. Her sister and her friend stated that they had seen nothing. On her next visit, she said that the "beautiful lady" asked her to return to the grotto every day for fifteen days. At first her mother had forbidden her from going, but Bernadette persuaded her mother to allow her to go. The apparition did not identify herself until the seventeenth vision, although the townspeople who believed she was telling the truth assumed she saw the Virgin Mary. Bernadette never claimed it was Mary but described the lady as wearing a white veil, a blue girdle, and had a vellow rose on each foot; she held a rosary of pearls.



The other contents of Bernadette's reported visions were simple, and focused on the need for prayer and penance. However, at the thirteenth of the alleged apparition on March 2, Bernadette told her family that the lady had said "Please go to the priests and tell them that a chapel is to be built here. Let processions come hither."

Accompanied by two of her aunts, Bernadette duly went to parish priest Father Dominique Peyramale with the request. A brilliant, but often roughspoken man with little belief in claims of visions and miracles, Peyramale told Bernadette that the lady must identify herself. Bernadette said that on her next visitation she repeated the priest's words to the lady, but that the lady bowed a little, smiled and said nothing. Then Father Peyramale told Bernadette to prove that the lady was real (that is, objectively) by asking her to perform a miracle. He requested that she make the rose bush beneath the niche where she appeared to Bernadette bud and flower in the middle of February.



As Bernadette later reported to her family and to church and civil investigators, at the ninth visitation the lady told Bernadette to drink from the spring that flowed under the rock, and eat the plants that grew freely there. Although there was no known spring, and the ground was muddy, Bernadette saw the lady pointing with her finger to the spot, and said later she assumed the lady meant that the spring was underground. She did as she was told by first digging a muddy patch with her bare hands and then attempting to drink the brackish drops.[1] She tried three times, failing each time. On the fourth try, the droplets were clearer and she drank them. She then ate some of the plants. When finally she turned to the crowd, her face was smeared with mud and no spring had been revealed. Understandably, this caused much

skepticism among onlookers who shouted, "She's a fraud!" or "She's insane!" while embarrassed relatives wiped the adolescent's face clean with a handkerchief. In the next few days, however, a spring began to flow from the muddy patch first dug by Bernadette. Some devout people followed her example by drinking and washing in the water, which was soon reported too.



Her 16th vision, which she stated went on for over an hour, was on March 25. During this vision, the second of two "miracles of the candle" is reported to have occurred. Bernadette was holding a lighted candle; during the vision it burned down, and the flame was said to be in direct contact with her skin for over fifteen minutes, but she apparently showed no sign of experiencing any pain or injury. This was said to be witnessed by many people present, including the town physician, Dr. Pierre Romaine Dozous, who timed and later documented it. According to his report, there was no sign that her skin was in any way affected, so he monitored Bernadette closely but did not intervene. After her "vision" ended, the doctor said that he examined her hand but found no evidence of any burning, and that she was completely unaware of what had been happening. The doctor then said that he briefly applied a lighted candle to her hand, and she reacted immediately. It is unclear if observers other than Dozous were sufficiently close to witness if the candle was continuously in contact with Bernadette's skin.



According to Bernadette's account, during that same visitation she again asked the lady her name but the lady just smiled back. She repeated the question three more times and finally heard the lady say "I am the Immaculate Conception". Four years earlier, Pope Pius IX had promulgated the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception.



Bernadette was a sickly child; she had cholera in infancy and suffered most of her life from asthma, and some of the people who interviewed her following her revelation of the visions thought her simple-minded. However, despite being rigorously interviewed by officials of both the Catholic Church and the French government, she stuck consistently to her story. Her behavior during this period is said to set the example by which all who claim visions and mystical experiences are now judged by Church authorities.



Her request to the local priest to build a chapel at the site of her visions eventually gave rise to a number of chapels and churches at Lourdes. The Sanctuary of Our Lady of Lourdes is now one of the major Catholic pilgrimage sites in the world. One of the churches built at the site, the Basilica of St. Pius X can itself accommodate 25,000 people and was dedicated by the future Pope John XXIII when he was the Papal Nuncio to France.



Disliking the attention she was attracting, Bernadette went to the hospice school run by the Sisters of Charity and Christian Instruction, where she finally learned to read and write. She then joined the Sisters of Charity of Nevers convent moving into their motherhouse at Nevers at the age of 22. She spent the rest of her brief life there, working as an assistant in the infirmary and later as a sacristan, creating beautiful embroidery for altar cloths and vestments. She later contracted tuberculosis of the bone in the right knee. She had followed the development of Lourdes as a pilgrimage shrine while she still lived at Lourdes, but was not present for the consecration of the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception there in 1876. She eventually died of her long-term illness at the age of 35 on April 16, 1879.



She was canonized on December 8, 1933 as the Catholic patron saint of sick persons, of the family, and of poverty.



El Caminito de la Esperanza

Two and a half years ago, one of our experienced volunteers and previous group leader and trustee, Angela Keane travelled to Peru on what was to become a life-changing experience. Angela tells us about her experience below. This is one of the outreach projects which The Trust has helped to support in recent years.

Last August '08 saw the end of my two year placement as an overseas missionary (with the Columban Sisters) in Ayacucho Peru. Here we set up a day service for children with an intellectual disability.



On my return visit in December '08 I was thrilled to see the service continuing with 95 children registered, while over 50 children attend the clinic each week for therapy.

I had a meeting with the Minister for Education in Ayacucho who has assured me he will sponsor a teacher who will commence this January. While the Minister for Health in Ayacucho will make a visit to our clinic in two weeks time so let's hope he too will make a commitment to his own special people.



I feel very privileged to have shared two wonderful years with the people of Ayacucho. They were so open in accepting me into their culture and giving me the freedom to work with their special children. While the people have so little and experience such poverty on a daily basis, they express such gratefulness & happiness through their smiling faces.



On a personal note my two years in Ayacucho was a life changing experience which continues to live with me on a daily basis here in Cahirciveen.



I want to thank you the family of The Irish Pilgrimage Trust for being so supportive to me these past two years in your letter writing, emails, your donations, not forgetting the odd bar of chocolate and continuous prayers, all of which were much appreciated, without you realising you were all working on home mission...... go raibh maith agaibh agus muchas gracias.



Hosanna House Pilgrimage 2009

This year our trip to Lourdes is from the 12th to the 19th of June. Everyone pays their own fare and this year it is €750.00 per person. The pilgrimage is

open to anyone who wants to apply – for example last year we had a husband with his sick wife, parents with sick children and young adults who would find it difficult to go on holidays alone.



We have lots of carers who willingly give up a week to make someone special have a great week. If you are interested please get a form from our HQ in Kilcuan and we can assure you of a wonderful experience for you and your loved ones. The entire Irish group is made up of 86 people divided into two separate groups, Group 513 and Group 514.

The Irish Pilgrimage Trust Walk to Santiago de Compostela

27th June - 4th July 2009



The Trust are again organising a walk to Santiago de Compostela this summer, from Saturday 27th June 2009 to Saturday 4th July 2009.

Santiago de Compostela is located in the northwest of Spain and legend holds that the remains of St James the Apostle were carried by boat from Jerusalem to northern Spain where they were buried on the site of what is now the city of Santiago de Compostela.

There are a number of places left on Walk 2 from Ponferrada to Sarria and Walk 1 from Sarria into Santiago de Compostela. [Walk 2 is for those who walked in 2007].

The cost of the trip is €500 (exclusive of flights) which is covered by the volunteer and it is proposed that each walker raise €1000. This funding will go towards the work of the trust and in particular for the development of the South East project (A holiday home in Kilrane, Co. Wexford).

The Walk to the Field of Stars



The first time that I heard about the Pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela was on the Channel 4 programme "Time Team". Whilst excavating a medieval monastery in England the archaeologists uncovered scallop shells in the graves – a sign that those monks had completed the pilgrimage. Saint James of the Field of Stars – who could resist? A seed was planted!

When the Trust advertised a walk for the summer of 2007 I put my name forward – and persuaded (bullied!) my sister to join me. We were so well looked after – communication and advice on training and preparation before, accommodation and support during, and recovery after!

gorgeous scenery, the wonderful people also walking the Way, and the sense of being on a journey.

We walked every step and received our certificates of completion before attending the Pilgrim Mass in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. People from all over the world were there, having also completed their journey. I really felt that I was part of something wonderful, and part of something ancient, and part of something that will go on.

Why not me?


Dear Lord, I will wait upon your answers, with faith that you will not turn away my questions, but use the instruments of your love to show me Your way to peace and to wholeness.



Pope John Paul II said:

"The young have shown themselves to be.....for the Church a special gift of the Spirit of God." Each Easter we realise how true his statement was when we witness the many young people who voluntarily give of themselves to help in whatever way they can on our Pilgrimage to Lourdes. Each year, The Trust invites young people from many different schools throughout the country to come and share in the wonderful experience which is Lourdes with The Irish Pilgrimage Trust.

One of the schools that will have students travelling this year is St. Joseph's in Castlebar. The students give us an insight into their preparation work for the pilgrimage below.

In September 2008, Fr Michael Murphy and Aiden Grealis from the Irish Pilgrimage Trust came to our school, St Josephs, Castlebar, to talk to us about their intentions to set up a youth group to go Lourdes in 2009 as helpers. They showed us a DVD about The Irish Pilgrimage Trust and the work they do while in Lourdes with their groups. We were invited to fill in application forms to be in this youth group. Seventeen students have committed to travelling this year.

Since September, we meet every month and discuss various topics about helping people with special needs and fundraising. This also helps us to bond with each other as a group. We enjoy these meetings because we sit around and discuss openly what we are planning for our youth group in the coming months. Everybody in the group is allowed to say what they think and we all listen to each other. We have some great laughs and most of all its good fun being in our youth group, and that's what we want to bring to Lourdes at Easter for the young people with special needs. We had some people from the Irish pilgrimage Trust who came to our meetings and spoke to us about

their experiences while they were in Lourdes over the years. We first had Mary McKeon and Walter Donoghue from Group 109. Fr Fergal Cunnane who is involved with Faith and Light talked to us about his experiences of living with young people with special needs in the L'arche community in France. John O'Reilly and Bridgeen Regan also travelled to come and speak with us. John who is a Trustee spoke to us about the history of The Irish Pilgrimage Trust and he also went into great detail about the Trust code of practice. Bridgeen then talked to us about the spiritual side of Lourdes and also her experiences while in Lourdes with The Irish Pilgrimage Trust.

So far, to raise money for The Trust, we have had a bag-packing day and a movie day in our School. Then we came up with the idea of travelling around Mayo on St Stephens's day, singing, dancing and playing music as the 'Wren Girls'. We also have plans to take part in a sponsored climb of Croagh Patrick in February and also organize some lunchtime concerts in our school.



We are all looking forward to travelling to Lourdes at Easter and working with the different groups from the North Western and Western regions. We know it will be a very worthwhile and positive experience, especially with the help of our group leaders, Fr Michael Murphy, Aiden Grealis, Marese O'Hora and Lisa Walsh. We are also looking forward to helping the young people with special needs in the groups that we will be involved with. We would like to thank the Irish Pilgrimage Trust for allowing our Youth Group to travel to Lourdes this year and for giving us an opportunity we will hopefully treasure always. Roll on Easter 2009!

My Lourdes Story

Growing up religion was always very important to my parents and they instilled this in myself and my brothers. Going to Mass was a must, the rosary would be recited as a family, and our parents would say prayers with us at night before going to bed. I found faith a great comfort and I had a picture of Our Lady in my room which I would talk away to just like I would any friend. At 12 I became ill and was

diagnosed with Syringomyelia, cysts in my spinal cord, which made my balance bad and walking very difficult. I underwent operations to fit shunts in my spine to try and drain the cysts to keep them from damaging my nerves and causing my health to fail anymore, but gradually, over the next few years, I went from using crutches, to using a wheelchair most of the time, to not being able to walk at all.

During this time my faith became even more important to me. To feel that there was someone watching over me, looking after me and making sure what was best for me would happen was a great comfort. It enabled to see that I was blessed when my health was good and not to take it for granted as there were many people who had a lot worse to deal with.

The year after I was diagnosed Patrick McNicholl RIP asked if I would like to apply to go to Lourdes with The Irish Pilgrimage Trust. I hadn't heard of The Trust before and was a bit scared at the thought of going away without my family when I didn't know many of the other people going, but I applied for it and was accepted to go with Group 68. The group were really friendly and devoted to helping all of us with a disability and I made friends with the other young people straight away. I had never been to Lourdes before and didn't know what to expect but when I first saw the grotto at night I was amazed. I couldn't believe how much faith everyone seemed to have and how many young people would be on their knees praying in front of the grotto. I loved the Masses as everyone would be singing and doing actions to the hymns which we wouldn't really see at Mass here.

Before I went to Lourdes I imagined that it was a place of prayerfulness and reflection, but I found that as well as this very important side of it, the group would have activities like picnics in Gavarnie and parties in the hotel. One vivid memory is the late Patrick giving us boiled eggs and breaking off pieces of crusty bread for each of us at picnic tables in Gavarnie before we got the chance to take it in turns to travel on a donkey or horse up the hills. The time went by so quickly and it was the best experience I ever had.

Some people go to Lourdes hoping for a physical cure. I wasn't healed physically but my cure was the gift of acceptance of my illness which to me has been invaluable. I left, feeling Lourdes was a very special place, and kept telling my parents they should go so two years later I went back with my mum, younger brother and great-aunt and uncle when I had the privilege of seeing St. Bernadette's body in Nevers

The year after my second trip to Lourdes my health became worse and I was bed bound for five and a half years. Once again my faith helped me to cope, and gave me the hope that I would get better and be able to get out again. Thankfully I got through the illness, and although, not able to walk anymore, I was at least able to lead a more normal life being out of bed.



The Trust started up a new group, 306, which was going to take 18-25 year olds to Lourdes and I was asked me if I would be interested in applying to go. I was delighted to get the chance to travel to Lourdes with The Trust again as I had loved going at Easter time, and from my experience of group 68, I knew what an enjoyable pilgrimage it would be, and the friendships you form with the others.

Once again it more than lived up to my expectations. I met more wonderful friends, each of whom added to making the pilgrimage such a great experience. One of my favourite times to visit the grotto was at night with the peace and stillness and the glow of the candles. It is like a piece of heaven on earth and that makes you sad to leave Lourdes. I am extremely grateful to The Trust for introducing me to the beauty of Lourdes. It is a place that makes you think that everyone should have the fortune of seeing at some stage in their lives and somewhere that gives you so many graces spiritually and the ability to cope with whatever difficulties may arise in life.
